This research aims to compare a small number (roughly 3-6) Harry Potter yaoi fanfictions written in Chinese with an equivalent small number written originally in English and then already translated into Chinese (by fans themselves) and, hence, already available in Chinese on fanfiction websites. Yaoi fanfiction refers to the genre of amateur creative writing which take a source text (here, Harry Potter) and develops it in new directions which include a romantic and/or sexual relationship between two male characters which was not an aspect of the original story. Fanfiction litters the internet and is a huge pastime for 100s of thousands of people (most often young women) across the globe. Yaoi fanfiction is one of the biggest genres and Harry Potter yaoi fanfiction is one of the most popular sub-genres. Scholarship on fanfiction is developing into a specialist area of inquiry and was in many ways initiated by Henry Jenkins' work on Star Trek slash fiction in the 1970s. There is virtually no research on yaoi fanfiction in China and none which compares the Chinese and Anglophone yaoi fanfiction on the same canon text. We are in the unique position of being able to undertake this research given that Professor Liheng Fan is Visiting Scholar in the School this year and that Yao Zhao (PhD student with Anna Madill) is, in additional to her own PhD work, part of the team in an essential advisory role given her familiarity with yaoi fanfiction sites in China.

The author of fanfiction posted to the internet is very often anonymous and, even when traceable to an online persona, available personal details may not be reliable. It is therefore possible that an author of fanfiction selected for analysis belongs to a vulnerable group and we would not know. Having taken advice from the Chair of the Ethics Committee, our obligation is to alert the webmaster, if at all possible, that we are selecting material for analysis for the site they host and to allow them to tell us to stop. It would be in many cases impossible, and in other cases overly intrusive, to attempt to find out more about individual authors. Having identified a small number (about 3-6) Chinese and (about 3-6) original Anglophone fictions already translated into Chinese for analysis, if at all possible, we will contact the relevant webmasters to explain what we are doing and requesting that they let us know if they would like us to stop but to try to do so within 10 days of receipt of the e-mail so that we have a date at which we

can commence analysis. Our expectation is that webmasters will not be concerned about our interest in analysing fanfiction. It has been written and posted online to be read and our interest is in a cultural comparison. This is likely to be received as a benign research intension – as indeed is the case – and we are not evaluating the apparent quality of the writing or commenting on or assessing the writers themselves. This research is atypical in psychology given that the content of the internet material is not personal – the material analysed are more akin to that undertaken in English Literature in being creative writing designed to be read by other people and to publically available as far as possible to secure an audience. We feel that it is important to provide the link to the original English fanfiction analysed, to the translated fanfiction, and to the Chinese fanfiction analysed in publications and reports of the research. This is to allow readers of our research to engage with the fanfiction themselves as far as possible in order to assess our analysis. Given that these are public texts posted on the internet for public consumption and are creative writing as opposed to personal, possibly 'confessional' information more usual in psychology research, that the obligation to allow our research to be assessed comes to the fore. We also are of the opinion that writers will be happy to have their creative writing highlighted in this way and for their work, possibly through being selected for a cultural comparison, to be more widely read. We make all this clear in our communication to webmasters.

The aim of the study is to undertake a cultural comparison of original Chinese and original Anglophone yaoi fanfiction. By selecting the same canon source text – Harry Potter – we are interested in understanding the impact of the two cultural settings have on the content and structure of the fanfiction. In order to increase the comparability and cultural significance of the material analysed, we are focusing on the popular yaoi theme of male-male marriage so are selecting also Harry Potter fanfiction in which the two main male protagonists are married.

This is a qualitative methods project. The design is comparative in that about 3-6 fanfictions in Chinese and the same number which are already translated into Chinese by fans, but originally in English, will be selected for comparison. They will be selected as being Harry Potter fanfiction in which the two main male protagonists are married. This narrowing of theme will aid the comparison. Focusing on male-male marriage will also be an interesting link to cultural understandings of this high profile, highly contemporary phenenomon. The material will be analysed using a variety of qualitative approaches, including thematic analysis.
